Principals Message

We are delighted to report that we had another busy and productive start to our school year. Our Grade 6 students will be participating in our Provincial assessments in math and literacy. We celebrated Anti-Bully Pink Day and participated in Terry Fox activities. On September 28th we acknowledged Orange Shirt Day to honour and remember the victims of the Residential School System. In follow-up, teachers engaged students in discussions, curriculum resources and learning opportunities centered on the history and culture of the Mi'Kmaq people.

Grade 6 Assessment

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (EECE) is continuing its assessment of student achievement in grade 6 Literacy and Mathematics. The grade 6 students are scheduled to write their assessments between October $18 - 27^{th}$. Detailed information was sent home to grade 6 families in September outlining the process. The information from these assessments is used along with classroom assessments to support individual student development in Literacy and Mathematics.

We celebrate Mi'Kmaq History Month in October. The theme this year is Mi'Kmaq Beadwork and the Art of Beading. Mi'Kmaq beadwork represents the life and creation. Generations of hands, eyes, backs, and fingers have worked for balance in intricate designs and colour palettes. From wampum and bone beads to suspenders and packed caps to contemporary medallions, beauty emerges from skill and love.

The goal of the month is to help Nova Scotians Build awareness of Mi'Kmaq history and heritage and to increase understanding of the province's rich Mi'Kmaq culture. A poster is produced, and numerous events are organized throughout the month in recognition of Mi'Kmaq History Month. Students in all grades will deepening their knowledge of Mi'Kmaq culture and history during the month of October and throughout the school year.
